# Reflections for the Family of God from the Rector

September-October 2017

**A**cts 2 <sup>42</sup> They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. <sup>43</sup> And awe came upon every soul, and many wonders and signs were being done through the apostles. <sup>44</sup> And all who believed were together and had all things in common. <sup>45</sup> And they were selling their possessions and belongings and distributing the proceeds to all, as any had need. <sup>46</sup> And day by day, attending the temple together and breaking bread in their homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts, <sup>47</sup> praising God and having favor with all the people. And the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved.

Dear Parish Family,

Harvey. Irma. Maria. Earthquakes in Mexico. Fires in the west. Hydrogen bomb detonated by North Korea. Violence over racial tensions and political protests. What next?

**How do we make sense of all this**, living as Christians in the 21<sup>st</sup> century? I don't have easy answers to that question, but I do believe that in times of tremendous challenge, there is tremendous potential for good within each of us that struggles to get out. The good within, promptings of the Holy Spirit, nudge us to rise to the challenge and make a difference in the lives of others. The good struggles against the feelings we have of already doing too much, of being overwhelmed, of not knowing what to do, and of the extra effort it will take. Yet it is for just such times as these that God has called us into mission in witness to His love.

Haven't you marveled at the good so many have done amidst these crises? Yes, many have suffered and have been weighed down with anxiety, but we have also witnessed deeds of heroism. More than once, I have seen victims who lost everything praise God even in the midst of the tragedy! I marvel at the generosity of those who have given to disaster relief. A reporter asked one family, who mentioned God: Aren't you mad at God, since you've lost everything? The response: I am so thankful that God saved us – we are alive. Another family I watched being interviewed said, Yes, we lost everything, but it is only "stuff". We have our

# Vestry Notes - June 12, 2017

1. The PLG report noted that a chair and co-chair for the Parish Fair scheduled for November 18, 2017 are still needed.

2. The Rev. Walley shared ideas for expanding Sunday evening services as well as ideas for the evolution of the Growth Committee.

3. The Vestry heard a report on the performance of the St. Luke's investment portfolio from Thomas Diemar, Chair of the Investment Subcommittee.

4. The Stewardship Committee (John Gallup, chair, Melissa Spencer, Dave Ingrey, Pam Craven) outlined its progress and upcoming actions for the 2018 Stewardship Campaign.

5. The Vestry authorized an expenditure of up to \$1000 for the purchase of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) device; prior to acquiring device, there will be an investigation of grants available from organizations that provide financial assistance to non-profits for the acquisition of AED devices.

6. A proposed contract for the engagement of The Rev. Allen Wakabayashi as Curate was reviewed, and after certain modifications were made, approved by the Vestry.

7. The Rev. Walley then indicated that he had been considering staffing for the Middle and High School Youth programs in light of Norm Penney's decision to retire from his role as director of Youth Ministry. He outlined a budget-neutral approach whereby Ms. Helene O'Neill, who currently leads the Children's Ministry, would also take on the Middle School Youth Group with the assistance of a part-time student intern, while he and Rev. Wakabayashi would take the lead for the High School Youth Group. He also noted that two parishioners wished to undertake fundraising specifically to support youth programs at St. Luke's. The Vestry authorized The Rev. Walley to look into the hiring of a part-time intern with the caveat that there would be no increase in the budget for youth programs.

8. The Rev. Walley noted that the Church's financial systems were nearing end-of-support and that the volunteers who have for many years logged in pledge payments were intending to retire. It would be an opportune time to investigate more up-to-date church information systems that require less manual intervention for future consideration by the Vestry.

family; that is what is really important. Faith does make a difference

at a time such as this. Faith can see us through, and when we follow the promptings of the Holy Spirit to do good – the "Light shines in the darkness."

I've been thinking about purpose lately. Have you reflected on this? **Why are you here?** Your Creator has given you life, breath, and all kinds of talents, resources and abilities. Why has He gifted you with these? **For what purpose has the One who gave you all good things called** *YOU?* What would He have you give and share? Where is He at work inviting you to release the good within you for the sake of others?

As the church, the Body of Christ, One Extended Family, we are called to spur one another on to love and good deeds. We are called to help one another be aware of the Presence of God. We are called to walk this journey of the life of faith together in ways that assist one another. And most of all we are to shine like light – to be sent out into the world – to offer words of comfort, love, and hope; to offer resources; and to offer our time, which is the most precious resource of all.


The church exists not just to make its own members feel good – it exists to share the love of Christ beyond the walls of our church buildings, making a difference in the world around us. We do this best when we are connected, centered in Christ. I love that scripture from Acts chapter 2. The church was birthed when, at Pentecost, 3000 people witnessed the Holy Spirit coming upon the disciples and were baptized. Then that very first church, those first Spirit-filled Christians simply did what came naturally. They were the church. They lived into God's purpose for them as individuals and collectively. # **Choral Evensong**

Sunday, November 5th 5:00 pm

A traditional Anglican service of Choral Evensong will be held on Sunday, November 5th at 5pm. Evensong is a service of sung Evening Prayer that offers an hour of music, reflection, and prayer toward the end of the day. It follows an historic liturgy from the Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, originating with Thomas Cranmer in 1549 and revised in 1662. The service will be filled with beautiful Anglican choral music and hymns, including the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis by Charles Wood, Preces and Responses by Kenneth Leighton, and anthems by Edward Bairstow and John West. Evensong is a great occasion to invite friends to St. Luke's for a beautiful, traditional service.
