I. WHAT IS A SABBATICAL?

From the Lilly Foundation:

“[A clergy sabbatical] strengthens Christian congregations by providing opportunities for pastors to step away briefly from the persistent obligations of daily parish life and to engage in a period of renewal and reflection. Renewal periods are not vacations, but times for intentional exploration and reflection, for regaining the enthusiasm and creativity for ministry, for discovering what will make the pastor’s heart sing.

Pastors serve a variety of roles in their privileged position at the center of congregational life: preacher, teacher, spiritual guide, pastoral visitor, friend, confidant. The responsibilities are continual, and the pace and demands of parish life can be relentless, often leaving even the most dedicated pastors recognizing the need to replenish their own spiritual reservoirs to regain energy and strength for their ministry.”

WHAT IS A SABBATICAL? (CONT.)

- A sabbatical is designed to allow the pastor time to renew, recharge, reflect, pursue areas of reflection and study that the normal demands of parish life do not allow for, time for perspective, and rest.
- The creativity, emotional resequencing, study, professional development, prayer, reflection and perspective needed for pastoral ministry require deep reflection and extended time, which the demands of parish life make impossible on a regular basis.

WHAT IS A SABBATICAL – WHY GIVE ONE?

From Thom S Rainer, Church Consultants:

1. **A pastor has emotional highs and lows** unlike most other vocations. In the course of a day, a pastor can deal with death, deep spiritual issues, great encouragement, petty criticisms, tragedies, illnesses, and celebrations of birth. The emotional roller coaster is draining. Your pastor needs a break—many times a break with no distractions.
2. **A pastor is on 24-hour call**. Most pastors don't have an "off" switch. They go to sleep with the knowledge they could be awakened by a phone call at anytime of the day. Vacations are rarely uninterrupted. It can be an exhausting vocation, and a sabbatical can be a welcome time to slow down.
3. **Pastors need time of uninterrupted study**. It doesn't usually happen in the study at church or home. There is always the crisis or need of the moment. Church members expect sermons that reflect much prayer and study. The pastor's schedule often works against that ideal. The sabbatical can offer much needed, and uninterrupted, study time.

WHAT IS A SABBATICAL – WHY GIVE ONE?

4. Pastors who have sabbaticals have longer tenure at churches. Though my information is anecdotal, I do see the trend. And while I cannot prove a cause-and-effect relationship, I feel confident that pastors who have sabbaticals are much more likely to stay at a church because they are less likely to experience burnout.
5. Pastors who have sabbaticals view the time off as an affirmation from their churches. I have heard from many pastors who share with me a sentence similar to this one: “I know my church loves me because they give me a sabbatical.” Pastors need affirmation. Sabbaticals can accomplish that goal.

AN INVESTMENT

This is an investment by St. Luke's in its leadership – which I firmly believe will result in many blessings to the parish through my ministry and through the ideas, experiences, study, and reflection I will bring back from my time away.

I already feel a spiritual pull toward profound renewal and spiritual experience!

WHAT IS “FRESH EXPRESSIONS”?

From Fx U.K. website:

Over 3000 Fresh Expressions are now active around the world. From the initial vision of Archbishop Rowan Williams and the Mission Shaped Church report (2004) a growing movement of practitioners and pioneers have formed Fresh Expressions of Church in the UK, across Europe and in North America.”
